- No legitimate prize delivered

Romance scams

- Online relationships built over time
- Emotional manipulation followed by financial requests
- Claims of emergencies or urgent needs

Tech support scams

- Pop-ups or calls claiming device issues
- Requests for remote access
- Charges for unnecessary or fraudulent services

Senior Scams Warning Signs

Scams often follow predictable patterns.

Watch for:

- Urgent requests for money or immediate action
- Pressure to respond quickly
- Requests for payment via gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency
- Requests for passwords or personal information
- Instructions to keep the situation secret

- Messages designed to create fear or panic

If something feels suspicious, pause and verify before responding.

How Families Can Help Protect Loved Ones

Families can significantly reduce risk through consistent communication and involvement.

Helpful habits include:

- Talking openly about scams and sharing examples
- Encouraging a “verify before acting” approach
- Reviewing bank statements and account activity
- Setting up call-blocking tools and spam filters
- Encouraging consultation before financial decisions

Creating a supportive environment makes it easier for seniors to seek guidance.
