****Make food visually appealing.****

Color, texture, and presentation matter. A plate with variety is more inviting than a monotone meal. Simple touches — a garnish, a colorful side dish, a warm bowl instead of a cold plate — can shift a senior's attitude toward eating.

****Prioritize protein and healthy fats.****

When appetite is limited, every bite should count. Eggs, Greek yogurt, nut butters, lean meats, fish, beans, and avocado are all excellent choices that deliver protein and healthy fats in manageable portions.

The Social Side of Eating

One of the most underestimated factors in senior nutrition is companionship. Eating alone, day after day, removes much of the pleasure from mealtimes. Seniors who feel isolated are significantly more likely to skip meals or eat less than they need.

Sharing a meal — even a simple one — changes the experience entirely. Conversation, laughter, and the presence of another person naturally encourage seniors to slow down, stay at the table longer, and eat more.
