Why Are Seniors So Often Targeted by Scammers?

It might feel like scammers have a radar for older adults—and in a way, they do. Many fraud schemes are designed with seniors in mind because scammers assume they may:

- Be more trusting or polite with strangers and hesitate to hang up or say “no.”
- Have savings, retirement income, or home equity that make them attractive targets.
- Live alone or have limited social contact, which can increase loneliness and vulnerability.
- Feel less confident with technology, online banking, and digital security.

Put all that together, and you get a group that scammers believe they can pressure, charm, or confuse. That’s exactly why awareness matters so much.

Common Senior Scams in Henrico

The tactics change, but the goal never does: get money or personal information. Here are some of the most frequent senior scams we see affecting families in and around Henrico.

Phone Scams

Scammers call out of the blue and pretend to be:

- Government agencies (like Social Security or the IRS)
- Utility companies
- Banks
- Even grandchildren or relatives “in trouble.”

They often:

- Create urgency (“Pay now or your benefits stop!”)
- Demand personal or financial information
- Insist on immediate payment

If a call demands action right now, that’s a huge red flag.

Email and Phishing Scams

- Banks or credit card companies
- Healthcare providers
- Popular retailers or shipping companies

They usually:

One careless click can open the door to identity theft.

Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

Here’s a classic:

“You’ve won a massive prize! You just have to pay the fees or taxes first.”

The catch?

- There is no prize
- The “fees” go straight into the scammer’s pocket
- The pressure to pay quickly is intense

Any contest that demands payment before you receive winnings should set off alarm bells.

Romance Scams

Online relationships can feel very real, very fast. Romance scammers:

- Build emotional connections through social media or dating sites
- Spend weeks or months earning trust
- Eventually ask for money—often for “emergencies,” travel, or medical bills

By the time they ask for help, many seniors feel deeply attached and want to believe the story.

Tech Support Scams

These scams often start with a pop-up or a phone call saying:

- There's a virus on the computer
- The device will stop working
- Important information has been "hacked."

Scammers then:

- Ask for remote access to the computer
- Charge for fake repairs
- Sometimes install software that steals more information

A legitimate company will not cold-call demanding remote access to a device.

Warning Signs of Senior Scams: What Should You Watch For?

Scams tend to follow the same script, even if the details change. Some warning signs to watch for include:

- Demands for immediate payment or urgent decisions
- Requests for payment by gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency
- Unsolicited calls, texts, or emails asking for personal or financial details
- Messages that stir up fear, panic, or guilt
- Pressure to keep the situation secret from family or friends

If something feels "off," that instinct is worth listening to. Pause, hang up, or close the message—and verify through a trusted number or website.

- Talk openly about senior scams and how common they are.

- Encourage "no quick decisions" on money matters—suggest a 24-hour rule before sending payments.
