What Is Elder Abuse?

Common types of elder abuse include:

- **Physical abuse** – hitting, pushing, rough handling, or using restraints in a harmful way
- **Emotional abuse** – yelling, threats, insults, humiliation, or deliberate isolation
- **Financial exploitation** – stealing money, misusing bank accounts, pressuring a senior to sign documents, or changing a will
- **Neglect** – not providing enough food, water, hygiene, clothing, medications, or medical attention
- **Abandonment** – leaving a senior alone without needed care, supervision, or support
