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Why Seniors Are Often Targeted

- Have savings, pensions, or a steady income, making them appealing targets.
- Live alone or feel isolated, which may mean they welcome any call or visitor who seems friendly.
- Aren't as comfortable with technology, making online and phone scams harder to spot.

Mix a trusting nature with high-pressure tactics, and it's no surprise some seniors get pulled into situations that quickly spin out of control.

Common Senior Scams in Guilford, CT

Scams come in many flavors, but a few patterns recur.

Phone Scams

Scammers might call pretending to be:

- A government agency
- A utility company
- A bank
- A grandchild or relative in trouble

They often use scare tactics or urgency: "Pay now or your account will be frozen," or "I need money today, or I'll be arrested." [They may demand payment right away](<https://alwaysbestcare.com/guilford/resources/protecting-seniors-from-fraud/>) or ask for personal details like Social Security numbers or bank info.

Email and Phishing Scams

Suspicious emails or texts might look like they're from:

- A bank or credit card company
- A doctor's office or insurance provider
- A well-known store or delivery service

They usually:

- Ask the senior to "verify" or "confirm" information
- Include links to fake websites that steal passwords or financial details
- Use logos and language that look real at first glance

One quick click, and personal data can land in the wrong hands.

Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

Here's a classic trap:

"You've won a huge prize, just pay the taxes or fees first."

The catch? There is no prize. Once money is sent, the scammer disappears. Seniors may be told to keep it "confidential," which makes it even harder for the family to catch the problem in time.

Romance Scams

Online friendships or romances can be heartwarming, but they can also be a gold mine for scammers. Over time, the [scammer builds emotional trust](<https://alwaysbestcare.com/guilford/resources/identity-theft-prevention-recovery/>), then asks for money for:

- A sudden emergency
- Travel
- Medical bills
- "Business problems"

By the time the story stops adding up, thousands of dollars may be gone.

Tech Support Scams

A pop-up appears on the screen, or a caller claims:

"Your computer is infected. We can fix it, just give us remote access or pay a fee."

Once they get access, scammers can:

- Lock the computer
- Steal information
- Charge for fake "repairs"

It sounds helpful on the surface, but it's anything but.

Warning Signs a Scam May Be in Play

Scams often share the same red flags. If you notice any of these, it's time to hit the brakes.

Watch for:

- Urgent demands: "Act now or there'll be serious consequences."
- Requests for unusual payment methods: Gift cards, wire transfers, cash, or cryptocurrency.
- Unsolicited contact asking for personal or financial information.
- Messages that stir up fear, guilt, or panic, pressuring quick decisions.
- Requests for secrecy: "Don't tell your family; they'll only worry."

If a request seems odd, rushed, or secretive, it's worth double-checking with someone you trust before doing anything.

How Families Can Help Protect Loved Ones in Guilford, CT

[Family involvement](<https://alwaysbestcare.com/guilford/resources/talking-to-family-and-friends-about-the-need-for-senior-care/>) is one of the strongest defenses against scammers. A few simple habits can go a long way.

Consider:

- Talking openly about common scams so they're less mysterious and less embarrassing to mention.
- Encouraging seniors to verify anything that feels off by calling the real company or asking a trusted friend or relative.
- Watching bank and credit card statements for odd charges or new accounts.
- Setting up call blocking and email filters to cut down on spam and robocalls.
- Creating a "double-check" rule: before making large payments or sharing financial details, the senior talks with a trusted family member.

The goal isn't to micromanage, but to build a partnership, "we're in this together," rather than "you can't be trusted with your money."

the situation.

- Keep a close eye on accounts and credit reports for ongoing or repeated activity.
- Offer calm reassurance, not blame. Many seniors feel embarrassed and may shut down if they sense criticism.

A caring, nonjudgmental approach helps them speak up sooner next time, which can prevent even bigger losses.

****Q:** How can I talk to my parent about scams without making them feel insulted?

A: Try framing it as something we're all dealing with: "Scammers are going after everyone these days, even smart people. Can we come up with a plan together so we both feel better about it?" That keeps the focus on teamwork, not fault-finding.

****Q:** Are landline phones safer than cell phones for seniors?

A: Not really. Scammers target both. Robocalls and spoofed numbers hit landlines and cell phones alike, so education and call screening matter more than the type of phone.

A: A great rule of thumb: No giving out personal or financial information, and no paying unexpected bills, without checking with a trusted family member or Always Best Care of Guilford, CT, first. That pause can be a lifesaver.
