Older adults are more likely to:

- Answer calls from unknown numbers
- Have accessible savings or retirement income
- Experience social isolation, which increases vulnerability to manipulation
- Be less accustomed to recognizing digital fraud tactics

Isolation, in particular, is a significant risk factor. When someone has limited daily contact with trusted people, a scammer who calls regularly can begin to feel like a familiar voice—even a friend.

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Scams That Commonly Affect Seniors

Understanding the most common types of scams helps families recognize them before real damage is done.

Grandparent Scams

A caller claims to be a grandchild in trouble, arrested, in an accident, or stranded abroad. They beg for money and ask the senior not to tell anyone. Government Impersonation

Scammers pose as IRS agents, Social Security Administration representatives, or Medicare officials. They may threaten legal action or benefit suspension unless immediate payment is made.

Tech Support Fraud

A pop-up or phone call warns of a virus on the senior's device. The "technician" requests remote access or payment for unnecessary repairs—and may use that access to steal financial information.

Romance Scams

These are among the most [financially devastating](<https://alwaysbestcare.com/hollywood/resources/commonly-missed-tax-deductions-for-seniors/>). A scammer builds a relationship online over weeks or months, then introduces a crisis requiring money. Victims often send thousands of dollars before realizing what has happened.

Lottery and Prize Scams

The senior is told they have won a prize but must pay fees or taxes to claim it. No prize exists, only repeated requests for payment.

Red Flags Every Family Should Know

Scams follow patterns. Once you know what to look for, they become easier to spot.

Be alert when:

- Someone demands immediate action or payment
- Payment is requested via gift cards, wire transfer, or cryptocurrency
- A caller asks for personal information you did not initiate sharing
- Someone instructs your loved one to keep a transaction secret
- An offer sounds too good to be true, because it is

Scammers rely on urgency and secrecy. If your loved one feels pressured to act fast or hide something, that is a serious warning sign.

How Families Can Build a Stronger Defense

Protecting a senior from scams is not a one-time conversation. It is an ongoing practice built on trust and open communication.

Practical steps to take:

- Have regular, judgment-free conversations about scams and how they work
- Encourage your loved one to pause and call you before responding to any unusual request
- Set up call-blocking tools or spam filters on their phone and devices
- Review financial statements together periodically to catch unusual activity early
- Establish a simple rule: no one legitimate will ever ask for payment via gift card

The goal is not to make seniors feel incapable of making decisions. It is to give them a trusted sounding board before acting on something that feels off.

What to Do If You Suspect a Scam

If you believe your loved one has been targeted or has already lost money to a scam, act quickly and calmly.

Immediate steps:

- Contact their bank or financial institution to report the situation and prevent further loss
- File a report with local law enforcement and adult protective services
- Report the scam to the FTC at [reportfraud.ftc.gov](<http://reportfraud.ftc.gov/>)
- Monitor all accounts closely for additional suspicious activity
- Offer reassurance; many victims feel ashamed and may be reluctant to talk

Shame is one of the biggest barriers to getting help. Approaching the situation with empathy rather than frustration will make it easier for your loved one to open up and

cooperate with next steps.

****Q: What should a senior do if they receive a suspicious call?****

A: Hang up without engaging. Do not provide any personal information, and do not call back using a number the caller provides. Contact a trusted family member or look up the organization's official number independently.

****Q: Are seniors required to report scams?****

A: There is no legal requirement, but reporting helps authorities track fraud patterns and may prevent others from being targeted. Reports can be filed with local police, adult protective services, or the FTC.

****Q: Can in-home caregivers help prevent financial exploitation?****
