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Why Senior Wounds Can Take Longer to Heal

A few other things can slow recovery, too:

- Not enough protein, vitamins, or fluids
- Pressure from sitting or lying in one spot
- Trouble moving around safely
- Higher risk of infection

What Kind of Wounds May Need Skilled Nursing?

Some wounds are fine with simple home care. Others need a nurse to keep a close eye on them and handle treatment the right way.

A home health nurse may be needed for:

- Surgical cuts that still need watching
- Pressure sores or bedsores
- [Diabetic foot wounds](#)
- Wounds linked to poor circulation
- Skin tears that keep reopening
- Burns or deeper injuries
- Long-lasting wounds that aren't improving

Warning Signs a Wound Needs Medical Attention

A wound that's heading in the wrong direction usually gives off a few clues. Keep an eye out for:

- Redness that spreads

- Swelling, warmth, or more pain
- Drainage or a bad smell
- A wound that looks worse instead of better
- Fever or chills
- Confusion or a sudden drop in energy

For seniors with diabetes or circulation problems, things can go south quickly, so don't brush off changes.

How Skilled Nursing Helps With Wound Care at Home

Pressure injuries can sneak up on someone who doesn't move much. A little prevention goes a long way.

Helpful steps include:

- Changing positions often
- Keeping skin clean and dry
- Using cushions or pressure-relief equipment
- Eating enough and drinking plenty of fluids

- Checking the heels, hips, tailbone, and elbows
