Why Seniors Are Often Targeted by Scammers

Tech Support Scams

- A pop-up warning on the computer claiming a virus has been detected
- A phone call from someone pretending to be from a well-known tech company

The scammer may ask for remote access to the computer or demand payment for “repairs” that aren’t needed, sometimes installing harmful software along the way.

Warning Signs of Senior Scams: What Should Raise a Red Flag?

Most scams share a few classic moves. If we keep an eye out for them, we’re already a step ahead.

Watch for:

- Pressure to act immediately or scare tactics
- Demands for payment through gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency
- Unsolicited calls, texts, or emails asking for personal details like Social Security numbers or bank info
- Messages that stir up fear, panic, or guilt to push someone into quick decisions

- Requests to “keep this between us” and not tell family members

If something feels off, it’s wise to pause, hang up, or close the email and check with a trusted person before doing anything else.
