Common Senior Scams in Parkville

Phone Scams

You know those calls that start with, “This is the IRS,” or “Your power will be shut off today”? That’s prime scam territory. Callers may pretend to be:

- Government agencies
- Utility companies
- Banks
- Even a grandchild or other relative in an “emergency”

They lean heavily on fear and urgency, pushing for immediate payment or private details such as Social Security numbers or bank account numbers.

Email and Phishing Scams

Emails or texts may look shockingly real; logos, colors, and even the sender’s name can be faked. They often say things like:

- “Your account has been locked”
- “Confirm your information now”
- “Your package couldn’t be delivered”

The link usually leads to a [fake website that quietly steals login information](<https://alwaysbestcare.com/parkville/resources/identity-theft-prevention-recovery/>) or personal data. One click, and the damage can snowball.

Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

This one sounds exciting at first:

“Congratulations, you’ve won a big prize!”

Then comes the catch:

- “Just pay the taxes or fees first.”
- “Wire money or buy gift cards to process your winnings.”

There’s no prize. Just money flowing straight into a scammer’s pocket.

Romance Scams

Online companionship can feel like a lifeline, especially for someone who’s lonely.

Scammers know that. They:

- Build a fake relationship over weeks or months
- Share emotional stories, often very dramatic
- Eventually ask for money for “emergencies,” travel, or bills

By the time money is requested, the emotional hook is often strong, making it very hard to say no.

Tech Support Scams

A pop-up flashes on the screen:

“Warning! Your computer is infected, call now!”

Or someone calls claiming to be from a well-known tech company. They might:

- Ask for remote access to the computer
- Request payment to “fix” fake problems
- Install software that actually steals information

Once scammers get remote access, they can snoop through files, passwords, and financial accounts.

Warning Signs of Senior Scams to Watch For

Watch for:

- Demands for urgent payment or “act now” pressure
- Requests to pay with gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency
- Unsolicited calls, texts, or emails asking for personal or financial details
- Messages that create fear, panic, or guilt
- Requests to keep secrets from family or friends

If something feels off, it probably is. Taking a moment to verify, by calling the real company or checking with family, can stop a scam in its tracks.

How Families Can Help Protect Loved Ones in Parkville

You don't have to be a tech whiz to help guard against senior scams. Consistent, caring involvement goes a long way. Helpful steps include:

- Talk openly about scams and share real examples
- Encourage verification of any unexpected call, email, or message
- Review bank and credit card statements for odd charges
- Set up call blocking, spam filters, and strong passwords
- Agree on a simple rule: no large financial decisions without checking with a trusted family member

Creating a judgment-free space is crucial. If a loved one feels they'll be scolded or shamed, they may hide what's happening, exactly what scammers want.

- Offer reassurance, not blame. Many older adults feel deeply embarrassed and may shut down if they feel judged.

A calm, supportive tone helps your loved one open up, share details, and work with you to fix what happened.

A: Watch for callers who demand quick payment, ask for personal information, refuse to let your loved one hang up, or insist on gift cards or wire transfers. Legitimate agencies don't pressure people like that.
