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Why Seniors Are Often Targeted by Scammers

Many seniors in Roseville may:

- Be naturally trusting and polite, even with strangers
- Have retirement savings, home equity, or a steady income
- Live alone or go long stretches without visitors
- Feel less comfortable with fast-changing technology
- Want to avoid "bothering" family, so they try to handle things alone

Put all of that together, and it becomes easier for a scammer to build fake trust, rush decisions, and slip away with money or personal information.

Common Types of Senior Scams in Roseville

Scam artists reuse the same tricks with new twists. Once you know the patterns, it's much easier to spot trouble brewing.

1. Phone Scams

The phone rings, and the voice on the other end sounds official, or desperate.

- Government agencies
- Utility companies
- Banks
- A grandchild or relative in trouble

They often crank up the pressure: "Pay now or your service will be shut off," or "Send money today or your loved one will go to jail." Urgency is their best friend.

2. Email and Phishing Scams

Fraudulent emails or texts can look shockingly real. They may appear to come from:

- Banks or credit unions
- Healthcare providers
- Well-known stores or delivery services

They usually include links such as "Verify your account" or "Track your package." With one quick click, the fake site tries to steal passwords, Social Security numbers, or banking details.

3. Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

This one sounds almost harmless at first: "You've won!"

The catch?

- The "winner" is told to pay fees, taxes, or processing charges before receiving the prize.
- The prize never shows up, because it never existed.

Seniors who grew up trusting mail and phone offers can be especially vulnerable here.

4. Romance Scams

Loneliness is a powerful doorway for scammers.

Over time, they build a warm, attentive relationship. Then comes the twist:

- A fake emergency
- A medical crisis
- A sudden business problem

Suddenly, they're asking for money, often repeatedly. The emotional bond can make it hard to say no, even when something feels off.

5. Tech Support Scams

A pop-up flashes on the screen: "Warning! Your computer is infected!" Or a caller claims to be from tech support.

Common tactics include:

- Asking for remote access to the computer
- Requesting payment for fake repairs or security services
- Installing programs that steal information

The language sounds technical and urgent, which can rattle someone who's not comfortable with computers.

Warning Signs of Senior Scams: What Should Raise a Red Flag?

Most scams share a few classic moves. When we help families in Roseville, we encourage them to watch for these warning signs:

- Urgent demands for immediate payment or action
- Requests for payment via gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency
- Unsolicited calls, emails, or texts asking for personal or financial information
- Messages that create fear, shame, or panic

- Instructions to keep the conversation secret from family or friends

Practical Steps You Can Take

- Talk openly about scams, what they look like, and how they work

- Agree on a simple rule: “Call me before you send money or give information.”

Most of all, keep the conversation gentle. Many seniors worry they’ll lose independence if they admit they’re confused or unsure. A warm, non-judgmental tone goes a long way.

- Report the scam to local law enforcement or adult protective services so it's on record.
- Monitor accounts and credit for any additional unusual activity.
- Offer calm reassurance. Many seniors feel embarrassed or guilty and may try to hide what happened.

Instead of asking, "Why did you fall for that?" we've seen it's much more helpful to say, "This could happen to anyone. Let's handle it together."

****Q:** How can I bring up senior scams without scaring my loved one?**

A: Try framing it as "There are a lot of new tricks going around. Can we talk through a few so we both know what to watch for?" Keeping the tone casual and cooperative often works better than lecturing.

A: Instead of arguing, suggest simple safety habits everyone in the family follows, like verifying unexpected calls or emails. That way, it feels like a shared plan, not a test of their abilities.

****Q:** Are all unsolicited calls dangerous?**

A: Not necessarily, but unsolicited calls asking for money, passwords, or Social Security numbers deserve extra caution. Hanging up and calling the company back using a known number is a safer approach.
