Romance Scams

These scams play on emotion. A scammer builds a bond online, then suddenly needs money for an emergency, travel, or some other sob story.

Tech Support Scams

A pop-up or caller claims a device has a serious problem. Then comes the hook: pay now or hand over remote access. That's how trouble starts.

Warning Signs That Something's Off

A scam often leaves a trail of little alarms. Watch for these:

- Urgent demands for money
- Requests for gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency
- Messages asking for passwords, Social Security numbers, or banking info
- Threats, fear, or pressure tactics
- Requests to keep things secret from family

If a message feels rushed or strange, that's your cue to stop and verify.
