What Is Elder Abuse?

Elder abuse happens when an older adult is harmed—or put at serious risk of harm—through someone’s actions or failure to act. It doesn’t always look like bruises or shouting matches. Sometimes it’s quiet, hidden in bank statements, unreturned phone calls, or a senior who suddenly “doesn’t want visitors.”

Common forms of elder abuse include:

- **Physical abuse** – Hitting, pushing, rough handling, or improper restraint.
- **Emotional abuse** – Yelling, threats, humiliation, manipulation, or intentional isolation.
- **Financial exploitation** – Misusing money, pressuring for signatures, changing wills or accounts for personal gain.
- **Neglect** – Failing to provide food, hygiene, medication, or basic safety.
- **Abandonment** – Leaving a senior without the care or supervision they clearly need.

Elder abuse prevention in Terre Haute starts with recognizing that harm can show up in many ways—and sometimes more than one at a time.

Warning Signs Families Shouldn’t Ignore

Abuse doesn’t usually announce itself with flashing lights. It creeps in, bit by bit. That’s why families need to pay attention to changes, even if they seem small at first.

Potential warning signs include:

- Unexplained bruises, injuries, or repeated “accidents” or falls
- Sudden withdrawal, sadness, nervousness, or unusual anger
- Poor hygiene, dirty clothing, or ongoing smells of urine or body odor
- Empty pantries, missed medications, or untreated health issues
- Strange bank withdrawals, new “friends” involved in money matters, missing valuables
- A senior who appears fearful, tense, or quiet around certain people
- Noticeable changes in eating, sleeping, or communication patterns

If your gut is waving a red flag, don’t brush it off. Ask gentle questions, look closer, and keep track of what you notice.

Risk Factors That Can Raise the Chances of Abuse

Not every risky situation turns into abuse, but some circumstances make seniors more vulnerable. By spotting these early, we can step in before problems snowball.

Common risk factors include:

- **Social isolation** – Few visitors, limited social life, or no regular check-ins
- **Cognitive decline** –

- **Physical limitations** – Needing help with bathing, walking, or toileting, which increases dependence
- **Money stress** – Financial dependence on others or lack of oversight for bills and accounts
- **Caregiver burnout** – A stressed, overwhelmed caregiver who's trying to do everything alone

Elder abuse prevention in Terre Haute works best when families address these risks early—before stress, loneliness, or confusion opens the door to harm.

Practical Steps Families Can Take to Prevent Elder Abuse

Families don't need fancy tools or complicated systems to make a real difference. Small, consistent steps can go a long way toward keeping seniors safe and respected.

Here are some practical ways to help:

Stay actively involved

- Visit regularly, at different times of day.
- Ask about daily routines, mood, and comfort—not just health.

Keep communication flowing

- Use phone calls, video chats, and in-person visits to stay connected.
- Ask open-ended questions: “How are things going?” instead of just “Are you okay?”

Watch the money

- Review bank statements with permission.
- Keep an eye on sudden changes in spending, new credit cards, or unpaid bills.

Build a circle of support

- Involve trusted friends, neighbors, and professionals.
- Make sure more than one person is checking in on your loved one.

Support the caregiver, too

- Offer breaks, help with errands, or a listening ear.
- Consider respite care so one person isn't carrying the entire weight.

Encourage social life and independence

- Support hobbies, senior centers, church groups, and community outings.
- Respect the senior's choices as much as safety allows.

These steps may seem simple, but they send a powerful message: "You matter, and we're paying attention."

Choose a quiet, safe place. Ask gentle questions like, "Has anyone hurt you?" or "Do you feel safe at home?"
- ****Document what you see and hear****
Write down dates, times, and specific concerns. Note injuries, changes in behavior, or troubling financial activity.
- ****Reach out for help****

Contact local adult protective services.

Speak with healthcare providers who know your loved one.

Call law enforcement if you believe there's immediate danger.

- **Follow up**

Don't assume one call solves it. Stay involved and keep checking in regularly.

Taking action can feel uncomfortable, but it may be exactly what keeps your loved one safe.
