The silver lining? Awareness packs a powerful punch. Once we know what tricks are out there and what warning signs to watch for, we can step in sooner, ask the right questions, and help loved ones stay safe without making them feel judged or controlled.

Why Seniors Are Often Targeted in Terre Haute

It's not that older adults are careless; far from it. But scammers know exactly which buttons to push. They often look for people who:

- Are naturally trusting or polite, even with strangers
- Have retirement savings or a steady income, like pensions or Social Security
- Live alone or feel isolated, with fewer daily visitors
- Aren't as comfortable with technology, online banking, or smartphones

Mix those factors, and con artists see what they think is an easy opening to build fake trust and twist the situation to their advantage.

Common Types of Senior Scams in Terre Haute

We're seeing a handful of senior scams over and over again around Terre Haute. The details change, but the playbook is surprisingly similar.

Phone Scams

Scammers may:

- Pretend to be government agencies (IRS, Social Security, Medicare)
- Pose as utility companies threatening to shut off service
- Call as a panicked grandchild or relative, begging for money

They lean hard on urgency: "Pay right now or else..." Once that fear kicks in, it's easier for them to get money or personal details.

Email, Text, and Phishing Scams

Messages may look like they're from:

- Banks or credit card companies
- Healthcare providers
- Big-name companies

They usually:

- Ask you to click a link to “fix a problem.”
- Request you to update the account information
- Ask you to log in through a fake site that steals passwords

One careless click, and suddenly someone else has access to sensitive information.

Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

The classic “Good news, you’ve won!” scam. Seniors are told they hit the jackpot—cash, cars, vacations—but they must pay fees, taxes, or processing costs first.

Here’s the harsh truth: if you have to pay to claim a prize, it’s almost always a scam.

Romance Scams

Online friendships that slowly turn into romance can be genuine—but scammers know that, too. They:

- Build an emotional bond over weeks or months
- Share dramatic stories about illness, travel, or hardship
- Eventually ask for money “just this once” for an emergency

By the time money enters the conversation, the emotional hook is deep.

Tech Support Scams

A pop-up or caller claims:

- “There’s a virus on your computer.”
- “Your device has been hacked.”

They then:

- Ask for remote access to the computer
- Charge for “repairs” that aren’t needed
- Install software that lets them come back later and steal more

If someone calls out of the blue about a “computer problem,” that’s a big red flag.

Warning Signs of Senior Scams to Watch For

No neon sign says “scam,” but the patterns are pretty predictable. Keep an eye out for situations where someone is:

- Pushing for immediate payment or demanding instant action
- Asking for money via gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency
- Requesting personal or banking information out of the blue
- Using fear, threats, or guilt to create panic or pressure
- Telling your loved one to keep the transaction secret

If something feels off, trust that gut feeling. It’s perfectly okay—wise, even—to pause, say “Let me think about it,” and check with family or a trusted source.

How Families in Terre Haute Can Help Protect Loved Ones

We don’t have to be tech experts or detectives to make a difference. A few simple habits can dramatically cut the risk of senior scams.

Consider:

- Talk openly about scams—share news stories, examples, and “what would you do?” scenarios.
- Encourage your loved one to verify any request for money or information.
- Review bank and credit card statements together for odd charges.
- Set up call blocking, spam filters, and strong passwords.
- Agree on a simple rule: “Before sending money or sharing info, call a trusted family member first.”

The goal isn’t to take over their life. It’s to build a partnership where they know they can ask questions without being scolded or embarrassed.

- **Monitor accounts closely** for new or repeated suspicious charges.
- **Offer calm reassurance, not blame.** Let them know they're not alone and that these schemes have tricked many people.

Shame keeps people quiet. Support and understanding help them speak up, which is the first step in limiting the damage and preventing it from happening again.

FAQ

Q: What's the easiest way to help a senior avoid scams?

A: Start with regular, honest conversations. Agree that any unexpected request for money or personal information should be double-checked with family or a trusted advisor before acting.

Q: Are phone calls from "Medicare" or the "IRS" always fake?

A: Government agencies rarely make surprise calls demanding money or personal details. If someone calls claiming to be from one, hang up and call the official number listed on their website or paperwork to confirm.

Q: How can we talk about scams without making our loved ones feel helpless?

A: Focus on working as a team. Use phrases like "Let's watch out for this together" instead of "You shouldn't do that." Emphasize that scammers are skilled and trick people of all ages.

Q: Can in-home caregivers really help spot scams?
