Common Senior Scams in Spring, TX

Scammers have more tricks up their sleeves than ever, and they know how to sound convincing. Here are some of the most common schemes targeting seniors today.

Phone Scams

Someone calls, sounds official, and suddenly everything feels urgent. They may pretend to be:

- A government agency
- A utility company

- A bank
- A grandchild or relative in trouble

The caller usually pressures for immediate payment or personal information, often using threats such as “your benefits will stop” or “you’ll be arrested if you don’t pay right now.”

Email and Phishing Scams

- Banks or credit card companies
- Healthcare providers
- Online stores or delivery services

The message usually includes a link to “fix a problem” or “verify your account.” That link leads to a fake website designed to steal passwords, account numbers, or other sensitive details.

Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

Here’s a classic:

“Good news! You’ve won a huge prize, but you need to pay the taxes or fees first.”

The catch? There is no prize. Once the scammer receives the “fees,” they disappear. Seniors can lose thousands of dollars chasing a win that never existed.

Romance Scams

This one hits close to the heart. A scammer builds a relationship online, slowly, patiently, lovingly. Over time, they:

- Share personal stories
- Express deep affection
- Talk about a future together

Then an “emergency” comes up: medical bills, travel costs, money issues. They ask for funds, promising to pay them back. The relationship, sadly, was never real.

Tech Support Scams

A pop-up flashes on the screen, or someone calls, saying, “There’s a serious problem

with your computer.” They may:

- Ask for remote access to the device
- Request payment for fake repairs or security services

Once inside the computer, [they can install harmful software](<https://alwaysbestcare.com/the-woodlands-spring/resources/identity-theft-prevention-recovery/>), steal data, or charge outrageous fees for “help” that was never needed.

Warning Signs of Senior Scams

Scams might vary, but the red flags often look very similar. If you spot patterns like these, it’s time to slow down and double-check.

Watch out for:

- Pressure to act immediately, “right now,” or “today only”
- Demands for unusual payment methods, like gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency
- Unsolicited calls, texts, or emails asking for personal or financial information
- Messages that stir up fear, panic, or guilt
- Requests to keep things secret from family or friends

If something feels off, it’s perfectly okay to pause and verify. A legitimate business or agency won’t mind you hanging up and calling back through an official number.

How Families Can Help Protect Loved Ones in Spring, TX
