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Why Older Adults Are Often Targeted by Senior Scams

Scammers rarely choose victims at random. They look for people they think they can pressure or confuse, then pounce. Older adults may be targeted because they:

- Tend to be polite and trusting with strangers, even on the phone
- Often have savings, retirement funds, or a steady income
- May live alone or feel lonely, eager for conversation
- Might be less familiar with digital technology, online banking, and new devices

Put all that together, and you've got a group of scammers who think they can push around. That doesn't mean seniors are helpless, far from it. It simply means we need to stay alert and talk openly about what's happening.

Common Types of Senior Scams in Westborough, MA

Phone Scams

The phone rings, and the voice on the other end sounds urgent or official. They might pretend to be:

- A government agency
- A utility company
- A bank or credit card provider
- A grandchild or relative in trouble

They usually:

- Demand immediate payment
- Ask for personal information (Social Security, bank numbers, Medicare details)
- Threaten fines, arrest, or power shutoffs

If someone is insisting you pay right now or you'll be in big trouble, that's [a huge red flag](<https://alwaysbestcare.com/worcester/resources/identity-theft-prevention-recovery/>).

Email and Phishing Scams

These scams show up in inboxes and text messages, often dressed up to look legit. Messages may appear to come from:

- Banks
- Healthcare or insurance providers
- Online stores or delivery companies

They usually include a link that leads to a fake website asking you to "log in" or "verify your account." Once you type your details, scammers grab them.

A good rule of thumb? Don't click strange links. Instead, go directly to the official website you trust and log in there.

Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

Who wouldn't want to hear, "You've won!"? Scammers bank on that excitement. They'll say you've won a prize, car, or cash, then claim you must pay "fees," "taxes," or "processing costs" first.

If you have to pay to claim a prize, it's not a prize. It's a scam.

Romance Scams

This one's especially heartbreaking. Scammers build an online relationship over weeks or months, saying all the right things. Then, suddenly:

- There's an "emergency"
- They "need help" with rent, travel, medical bills, or a business deal

They push for money, often over and over again. [Loneliness and isolation can make this scam hit even harder.](<https://alwaysbestcare.com/worcester/resources/increasing-socialization-to-reduce-isolation-and-loneliness-in-aging/>)

Tech Support Scams

A pop-up appears on the computer, shouting about a virus. Or someone calls, claiming to be from "tech support." They say:

- "Your computer is infected."
- "We detected suspicious activity on your account."

Then they ask for:

- Remote access to the computer
- Payment for "repairs" or "protection plans"

Once they're in, they can steal information or install harmful software.

Warning Signs of Senior Scams: What Should Raise an Eyebrow?

Scams may differ in detail, but they share common warning signs. If you or your loved one notices any of these, it's time to hit the brakes.

Watch for:

- Pressure for immediate action - "Do this now or else..."
- Requests for unusual forms of payment - gift cards, wire transfers, cryptocurrency
- Unsolicited calls, emails, or texts asking for personal or financial information
- Messages that stir up fear or panic - claims of arrest, lawsuits, or cut-off services
- Demands for secrecy - "Don't tell your family; they'll only worry."

If something feels off, it probably is. Taking a moment to verify can save a world of trouble.

How Families in Westborough, MA Can Protect Their Loved Ones

We don't have to fight senior scams alone. Support from family and friends can make a huge difference. Simple, steady habits can go a long way.

Helpful steps include:

- Talking openly about common scams and new tricks you're hearing about
- Practicing "pause and verify" – encourage your loved one to hang up and call back using a known, official number
- Checking bank and credit card statements for unfamiliar charges
- Setting up call blocking and email spam filters
- Agreeing on a "trusted person" your loved one can call before sending money or sharing information
